

Represented South Central in the England Hockey Masters National Championships Jonah Pedreme Surviviving England Hockey Training 101

Last weekend I spent my time up in Lilleshall Sports centre in Shropshire, one of the 2 main training centres for England Age Group hockey. I was attending the first part of my England Boys U18s Trials. It was a surreal experience training with 55 Boys U18s made up of the existing England Boys U18 squad, last season's England Boys U16 squad, and 13 of us newbies selected via the Talent Academy system from around England. I was hoping it was to be the first of many trips up there.

The weekend started with a long 3hr drive up to the sports centre. We dropped our bags at our accommodation located on sight, and then congregated in one of the large halls where we met the rest of the players and listened to the England coaches' presentation about the structure of the weekend and how the selection process will pan out over the next few weeks. Among many things they emphasised that they were looking at current ability, but especially a player's potential. Afterwards, we headed off to the pitches for the first of four sessions.

The first session was infamous for being the hardest - its sole purpose was to test a player's fitness. The coach said "you've got to love continuous running to play at this level of hockey". After a lengthy warm-up we went into the staple fitness test of England Hockey; 16 pitch lengths, as fast as you can. It's normally a gruelling test of stamina but on that day it was even harder as we did the test in stifling 30 degrees!

Everyone was preparing with buckets of water before the run. Less than 10 minutes later, the 2 groups had finished with a few having to stop half way with injuries. My time was 5:22 which I was pretty happy about as it succeeded my expectations and I beat the practice times I had done before. The rest of the session was really tough physically with the coaches splitting us into 4 groups and doing a variety of continuous 1v1 drills for the next hour and 30 minutes.

Luckily to recover the amazing staff of Lilleshall produced some great food throughout the weekend, so after a quick break we were replenished and ready for the next session. With the coaches decision to have our last session later then usual to combat the extreme heat, we ended the day under the floodlights playing in a 9-a-side full pitch triangular tournament, a tournament that would continue into the next day after some morning training.

In the evening we went back to our rooms and got changed ready for some dinner and a team meeting, which also included watching the rugby World Cup together as a team. After an inspirational England victory we were ready for bed.

We had a fantastic breakfast buffet in the morning to get some energy ready for the final chance to impress the coaches and hopefully earn a spot in the team squad for 2024. Training started like always with a team warm-up, then we set off into our 3 teams from the day before and had 1 hour to practise and impress with our penalty corner attack and defence. That took up half the training and with the other half we did some overload and underload situations.

Although originally from Leeds, my hockey journey started at secondary school in Carlisle, back in 1975. Whilst living in the north, I played for a number of clubs/teams and gained my first county experiences with Cumbria and Yorkshire.

I moved to Reading in 1990, where I still live. During this time, I played hockey at Sonning for 3 seasons, before joining Bracknell in '93 to play in the National League Division 1. It all came down to the last game and we needed to win to secure promotion. We won 1-0 and yes, I scored the open play goal that saw us promoted to National Premier League! Not a bad way to make an impression in your first season with the club. Particularly as I am a natural defender, yet I found myself playing as a forward on a weekly basis. Who knew!

In '96/'97, my partner in crime, Duffy (some of you may know him from his time at Wokingham HC as a GK, or when he umpired in the NPUA), took a year out to travel, starting our trip watching hockey at the Atlanta Olympic Games.

Instead, we played an International Tournament in Nottingham in 2021. An amazing experience. (Been there, got the t-shirt...well, several t-shirtsactually!).

In August 2023, I represented Alliance International Hockey Club in the Women's O55 age group in the Scottish Thistles International Masters
Tournament in Dundee. Whilst there were no actual 'winners', we were the most successful team. We won all our games except for 1, which was a 1-1 draw (the only goal we conceded). The last week in August we played in a place called Bra, in Italy. What a challenge. 7 games in 7 days, in temperatures averaging around 37/38°, even making it up to 40°.

Back from our travels, I returned to Sonning for a few seasons, before joining Wycombe. Just before joining Wycombe, I developed Type 1 Diabetes. Not quite the 50th birthday present I was anticipating! For those who don't know, Type 1 is when your body no longer produces insulin. I have to manage my condition on a daily (if not hourly) basis and inject insulin to survive. Suffice to say every day is like a science experiment, a challenge I meet head on. On the plus side, T1 normally affects people in their early years so it is official, I have never grown up
